About the new Alameda County Juvenile Justice Center

Alameda County will open a new Juvenile Justice Center in April 2007, a step that will bring state-of-the-art facilities to the County's juvenile detention and courts programs, and enable fundamental changes in the way the County works with young people and their families. The Center is designed to allow new levels of collaboration between County agencies and community-based organizations, with the facility becoming the common link in a continuum of care based on comprehensive screening and assessments of incarcerated youth. The Center will also provide a healthy indoor environment with natural light and fresh air. The County will reduce global warming impacts through onsite solar power and will save taxpayer dollars through energy efficiency, water conservation, and waste reduction. Exceeding the County's Green Building Ordinance, the Center was constructed to meet the US Green Building Council's LEED® Gold standard. The facility is home to 17 major site-specific artworks and 45 framed artworks commissioned through the Alameda County's "2% for Art" public art ordinance managed by the Alameda County Arts Commission, on behalf of the Alameda County Board of Supervisors.
